The Deep South Food Alliance (DSFA) is a network of organizations, producers, and aggregators in southeast, central, and west Alabama and eastern Mississippi.

Organized in 2012, **DSFA** is a coalition of individuals and organizations across the Black Belt who share a guiding objective: to advance historically disadvantaged rural communities by supporting agriculture economies, particularly low-resource smallholder farmers of color.

Led by project director Andrew Williams, CEO of the United Christian Community Association (TUCCA), **DSFA** harnesses the specialties, infrastructure, and local networks of member organizations to provide training, technical assistance, and market connections to more than 100 smallholder farmers in the region it serves.
